

## **Huntsville Public Library**

Get ready to party. There will be birthday cake and lots of festivities as Huntsville Public Library observes its 50th birthday. At a celebration on Saturday, September 23, citizens will even get a chance to sing "Happy Birthday" to the library. "There will be a lot of fun things for the kids and adults to do," says Linda Dodson, city librarian. Another party will be held on Sunday, September 24, 50 years to the day after the Huntsville Public that's pretty special." Library celebrated its grand opening. In the mid-1960s, a grassroots effort to build a public library in Huntsville got some help from a little girl. Vicki Davis Christopher, then nine years old, wrote to Huntsville Mayor its size, growing to about 22,000 square feet, Raymond Wright, urging the city to establish a public library. The letter was published, support grew, and in 1967, a facility of about adding new programs, materials and tech-7,000 square feet was complete. Over the years, the library became utilized so widely, the original facility was no longer adequate. In 2009, about 80 percent of voters approved a bond referendum to enlarge the library. "It was the only library bond election in Texas that passed that year," Linda says. Remarkably, the library more than tripled without ever closing its doors to the public.
